THE HOLT-ELWELL MEMORIAL FOUNDATION

A VISION FOR THE FUTURE OF MOWGLIS



In 1962, a small group of alumni and former staff came together to form the Holt-Elwell Memorial Foundation, purchasing the financially-struggling Camp Mowglis from John C. Adams, then owner and Director. The nine men who served on the original Board of Trustees had attended camp or worked on the staff under Colonel Alcott Farrar Elwell, and had been deeply influenced by him. Under the leadership of J. Tyson Stokes, William MacDonald, and William B. Hart, they worked tirelessly to preserve Mowglis' ideals and to secure its future.

Mowglis today is a fulfillment of their vision. Our enrollment is strong and diverse. We remain true to the founding ideals of Elizabeth Ford Holt. Our program carries forward the mission of the "School of the Open" articulated by Colonel Elwell nearly a century ago. And the Mowglis experience continues to inspire a new generation of campers to strive to be the best version of themselves. In short, the Mowglis Spirit is alive and well.

The Foundation's charter remains unchanged, to provide a steady hand as we look to the future so that Mowglis will continue to guide generations of boys on their journey to becoming young men. This important stewardship is a shared responsibility, and it is only made possible through the ongoing investment and dedication of our entire community.

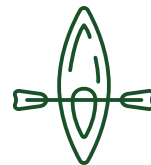

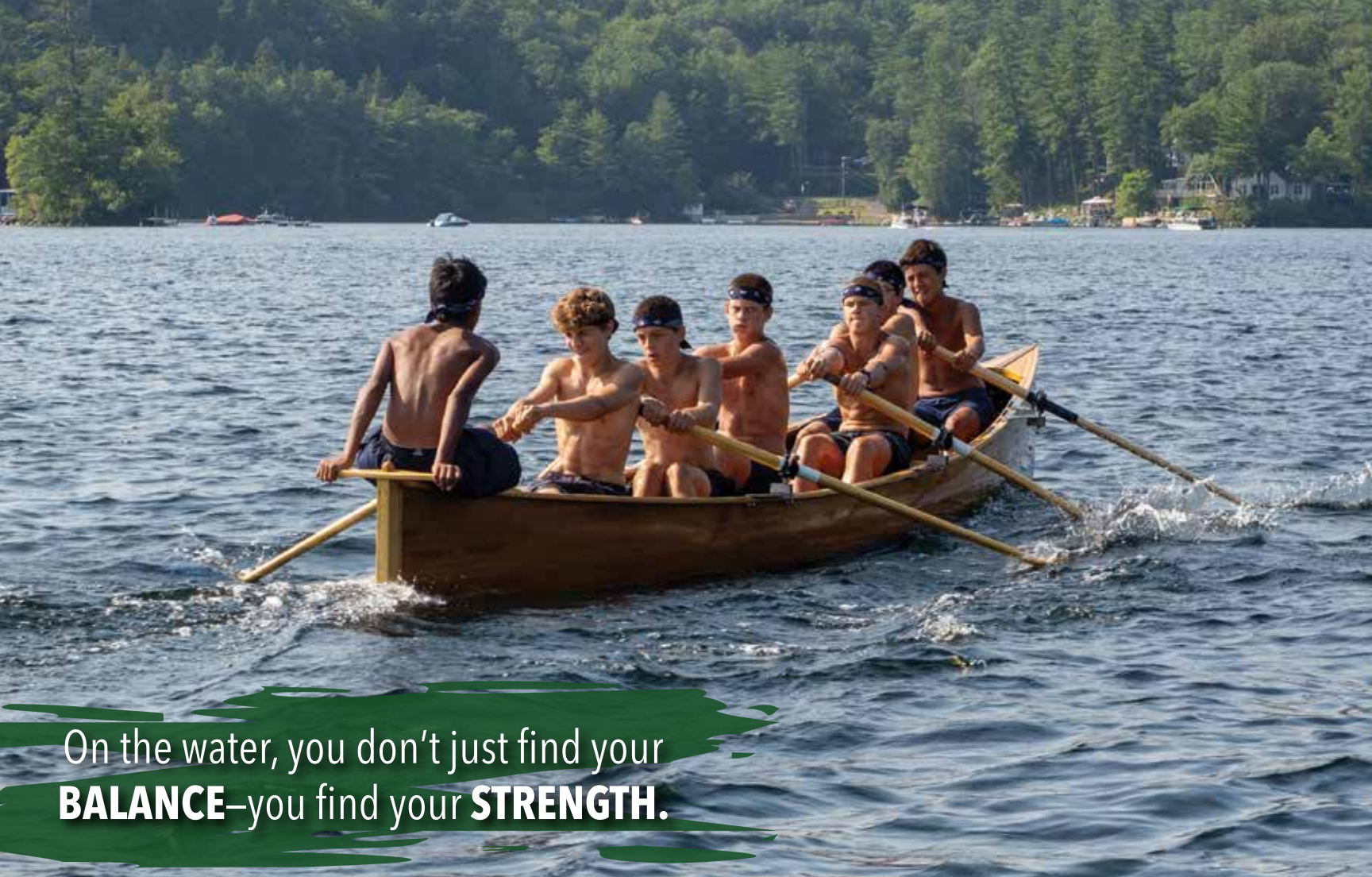

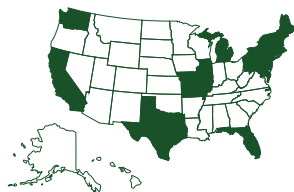

Your gifts to the Annual Fund directly bridge this gap. This community support ensures we can invest in top-tier staff, preserve our historic grounds, and provide vital need-based scholarships, keeping the Pack strong, diverse, and ready for the future.



WHAT IS THE ENDOWMENT?

An endowment is a permanent investment fund that provides Mowglis with a consistent, reliable stream of income. The core funding is strictly protected, while a small annual withdrawal—**up to 5% based on a three-year rolling average**—is used to fuel everything from historic property maintenance to camper scholarships.

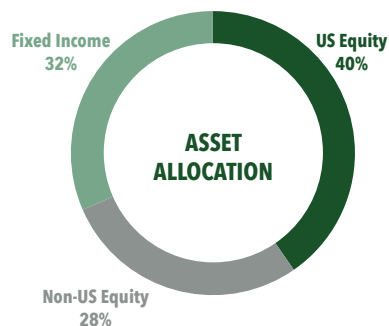
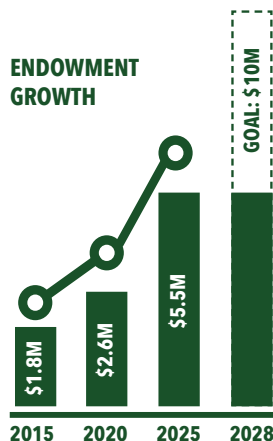

STRONG FINANCES FOR A STURDIER FUTURE

MOMENTUM TO THE \$10M SUMMIT

Over the past decade, strategic leadership and the immense generosity of our community have grown our endowment threefold. We have climbed from \$1.8 million in 2015 to \$5.5 million in 2025. This growth allowed us to increase our annual budget contribution for tuition and programs from \$80,000 to \$230,000, drastically broadening our scholarship reach and camp accessibility.

As we march toward our 125th anniversary in 2028, our immediate summit is to reach \$10 Million. Crossing this threshold will permanently protect camp from economic shifts, mitigate steep tuition increases, and secure inclusive participation for families today, all while building the foundation for our next era of growth.

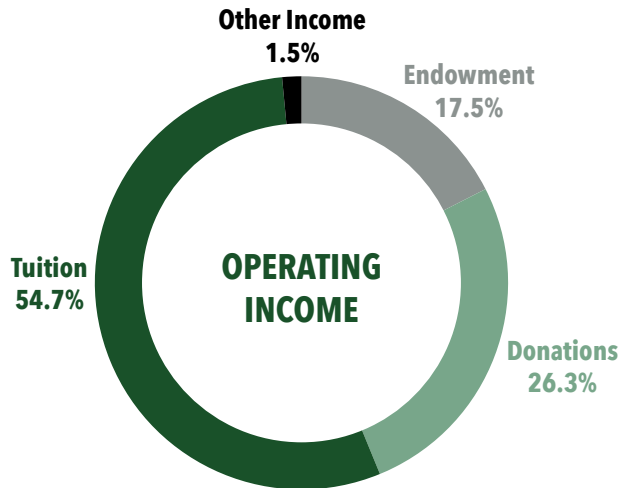


Actively managed by our five-person Investment Committee, our portfolio is carefully balanced to maximize long-term growth while protecting this invaluable revenue stream for the next generation.

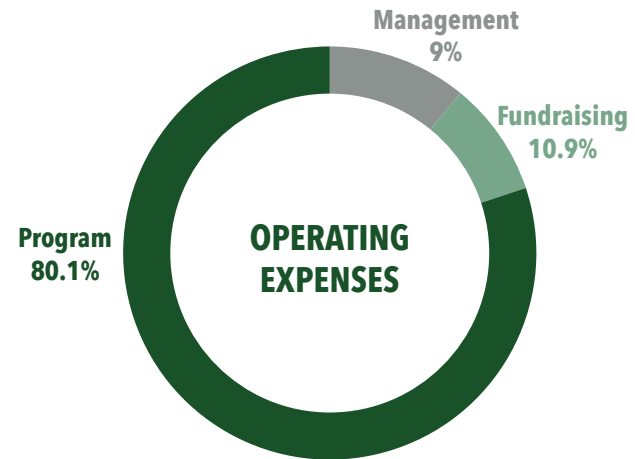
OUR **ANNUAL FINANCIAL** PICTURE

THE VISION OF A MOWGLIS MAN



In 1907, our original waterfront changing house was built from reclaimed barn boards. For over a century, it stood proudly on the shores of Newfound Lake as a symbol of aspiration, marking the exact spot where generations of boys declared their hope to become swimmers, oarsmen, and crew leaders.

Decades ago, alumnus, crew coach, and trustee Buzz Ringe ('50) noticed that a towering, decaying white pine was beginning to threaten the safety of the historic structure. What began as an observation evolved into a forty-year commitment. Buzz envisioned a larger, safer structure built further back from the water's edge, allowing for a wider beachhead, better visibility for spectators on Crew Day, and a safer access point for camp operations.

Though Buzz did not live to see the foundation poured, his vision became the foundation for the largest capital project in our modern history.

Hope-to-Be, Too: *Taking Shape in 2025*

A look back at the incredible momentum on the waterfront this past year. From breaking ground to raising the timber frame, your generosity brought this project to life beam by beam.





True to the self-reliant spirit of *Mowglis, Hope-to-Be, Too* was built entirely with native white pine harvested from our own property. These trees were selectively cut, milled, and raised on-site, ensuring the building remains rooted in the forest our campers explore and protect.
